

Then she'll be demonstrating how vintage blocks from that era have been combined with quilting from the 1950s and 1960s.

Ann Harris and the Sew Toos Friendship Group will be providing food from vintage recipes that our mothers, grandmothers, and great-grandmothers whipped up for their families. Remember Spam and Chipped Beef on Toast? Chiffon Cakes and Jell-O mold salads? Yum!!

In keeping with this theme, Hospitality has been asked to decorate with reminders of the past including...are you ready for this...Aprons! So, we're asking you, our guild members to wear your aprons on January 8. Maybe you inherited an H-back or bib style apron from the 1930s or wore an apron matching your mom's in the 1940s. By the 1950s, womens' clothing fashions were becoming more sophisticated, and women made aprons to reflect that sophistication. Do you still have one of those you can wear? Or, how about the 1960s? Sew What's in Your Cup?

This month's pattern for Block of the Month is an easy one that should go together in less than an hour including the cutting and pressing! If you're using your own fabric stash, we request that you use a blue or white background so that the finished blocks will have some cohesiveness. Also, the cup and the handle can be of the same fabric or not - your choice.



Cutting instructions:

Background (white or blue) 9"x 11" is plenty

A - 2 1/4" x 8 1/2"

B - [2] 2" x 5 1/4"


C - 2" x 8 1/2"

D - 1 1/4" x 1 1/2"

E - 1" x 2 1/4"

F - 1 1/2" x 1 3/4"

G - [2] 1 1/4" squares



Cup (main print) 5" x 6" is plenty

H - 4 1/2" x 5 1/4"

Cup Handle 3" x 4" or 1 1/2" x 6" is plenty (can be the same or different from the main fabric)

I - [2] 1" x 1 1/2"

J - 1" x 2 1/4"

Let the sewing begin using a 1/4" seam allowance throughout.

1. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the [2] G 1 1/4" background squares. Matching the diagram, place the right sides together on the bottom corners of the cup H piece. Sew on the diagonal lines. Trim to 1/4" and press the seams toward the cup.
2. Sew E to J. Press toward the handle. Following the diagram, sew the [2] I's to the top and the bottom of the E/J unit to make the cup handle. Press the seams toward I. Then sew D and F to the top and bottom of the handle as shown in the diagram and press the seams toward I.
3. Sew the unit created in Step 2 to the cup created in Step 1. Press the seams toward the cup H. Then sew the [2] B's to each side of that unit and press toward B.
4. Following the diagram, sew A (this is a different size than C !!!) to the top and C to the bottom of the unit created in step 3. Press seams toward A and C respectively. You should now have an 8 1/2" block. Now, relax and have a cup of coffee or tea to celebrate that it's no longer an UFO unless, of course, you win all of the blocks!
