
Sylvia Williams closed the meeting.

This is called "Brush Strokes." It's 60" X80".


I machine pieced and quilted this for my godson's graduation from high school. The pattern was from a *Better Homes and Gardens* book. I had so much fun making this quilt!

HOW TO WATCH A MEETING ON ZOOM

- 1. **DEVICE**: A cell phone, tablet, or computer with a camera and an Internet connection.
- 2. **GETTING ZOOM AND LOGGING ON**: Two ways, and you don't need an account. First, go to Zoom.us and click on "join a meeting," then type in the Meeting ID and Password. Second and easiest way is to check your email for an invitation and click on the link. The link takes you directly to the meeting. This invitation will be sent out the morning of the meeting.

3. ETIQUETTE DURING A MEETING:

- A. When you join a meeting you will be muted. If you come in early and want to visit with the other members, unmute yourself by clicking on the microphone in the lower left of your screen.
- B. Use the Chat box to make comments and send questions to the Moderator.
- C. If your screen doesn't show your name, please rename it so that we all know who you are. To do this, hover over your own picture until three dots appear in the upper right corner. Click and select "rename".
- D. Phone and Tablet users: use your device in the horizontal/landscape position.
- 4. **AUDIO and VIDEO**: When you first sign in, click on "mute" (headset) and "audio" (microphone) so that both no longer have a red line running through them.
- **NOTE**: if you have muted yourself, the moderator cannot turn on your mute or video. She can, however, send you a pop-up message asking you to unmute yourself or turn on your video.
- 5. **GALLERY AND SPEAKER VIEWS**: Controlled by clicking your choice in the upper right corner of the screen, Gallery View shows a thumbnail of everyone present over several pages if necessary, while Speaker View shows a large screen of the person who is talking.
- 6. **CHAT**: You can send either a public or private message. iPhone and Tablet click on the dropdown menu under Participants and under # dots. Computer Click Chat on lower tool bar.
- 7. **PINNING A SCREEN**: Use this function when a speaker is presenting a program, or during an event such as Show & Tell. **COMPUTER/TABLET**: you must first be in "Speaker View". Move your cursor to the upper right of the speaker's thumbnail and click on the 3 dots.. Now click on "Pin Screen" in the dropdown list. To unpin, click on "unpin" in the upper left corner of the large image. **IPHONE**: Swipe right

to left to move from Speaker View to Gallery View. Double-click on any image to pin that person. To unpin, double-tap on the large image.

8. **READY TO LEAVE THE MEETING?**: **COMPUTER/TABLET** – On the toolbar at the bottom of your screen, look for a red button at the end on the right. **IPHONE** – tap the screen and look for a red button that says "leave". Click and you're done.

You ladies have been putting the sewing machine peddle to the metal. We have a total of 42 quilts turned in toward our goal of 200. That gets us to 21% toward the goal number. It's pretty fun to open the bin on my porch and see quilts turned in and kits taken. The bin remains stocked with kits located at my front door.

On October 27, I delivered 40 baby quilts to the Naval Hospital at Camp Pendleton. I had my neighbor drive me on the base with her elementary-aged children. She has been the recipient of baby quilts some six and eight years ago. It was fun to share with the youngsters that now we are providing quilts for the new babies as they had received one themselves.


Although volunteers are presently not able to go on the ward daily with their cart to distribute quilts, they have found a way to get them to the new moms. Vicki Miller, of the Pastoral Care Services, brings the quilts to an event where the Red Cross distributes diapers and formula to new military moms. Anyone present at this service who delivered their baby at the base hospital gets to pick out a baby quilt. If any guild members know of a baby born at the base hospital and they did not receive a quilt, let us know, and let's see if we can get one to them.
