



Minutes from the General Meeting

Fallbrook Quilt Guild August 5, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 6:05. Our new President, Frannie Marr, introduced herself. She also thanked the old board members for supporting the Guild during the last year.

Frannie shared some changes that will take place at our future meetings. There will be more interaction encouraged with the round tables; the community center meeting room will be split in half to reduce rental fees; new meeting time will begin in September with the center being open at 1:00 p.m. and meeting beginning at 1:30 to avoid school traffic; the year will feature four speaker meetings, four member-led meetings, two potlucks, and two dark months (January and July). Sign-up sheets are on your tables; you are requested to complete, indicating personal interests for future socialization.

Ardis Duhachek and her Sew N Sew Friendship Group conducted the installation of new Board Members. It was a very creative and entertaining installation. New officers included Frannie Marr, President, Ann Turley, 1st VP, Karen Johnson, 2nd VP, Tricia Voight, Secretary; Barbara Anderson, Treasurer; Penny Bottomly, Ways and Means; Linda Rosensteel and Barbara Erickson, Membership co-chairs. Collette Ford, Compliance Officer was absent. Each new officer was individually installed by a member of the friendship group and presented with a personalized quilt block and a pair of earrings to commemorate the occasion. Mara Woods received special recognition for her efforts to ensure that the Guild continued during the pandemic break. Her mini quilt honored her as "Queen of all Organizers."

Ann Turley provided information on upcoming programs. Tools in your Toolbox will be the program in September. October will center on mini workshops led by members. Volunteers are needed to teach or share a personal skill or technique. November will feature a mini quilt show, possibly with a featured member-speaker. December is our holiday potluck.

A reminder to complete the interest sheets on each table; Karen will identify topics of interest and what you would like to share and/or teach.

Our featured speaker for this evening was Allison Allen from Sun City. She is a well-known story-teller and prize-winning quilter. Her topic for the evening was "51 Fun Ways to use fabric Yo-Yos". She uses yo-yos in all her quilts. Allison has been quilting since the 1990s and has entered quilts in many shows both within and outside the U.S. She shared that she doesn't enter to compete but to explain, as all her quilts tell a story. Many of them depict significant moments in Black history. One of her quilts of African American history was chosen by Time Warner Cable and exhibited during Black History Month. Her presentation attested to her skill as a quilter and a storyteller.

After the presentation committee reports were made.

The X's and O's Block symbolizes the Membership Committee Co-Chairs. This block represents the love of the Fallbrook Quilt Guild by their members. Barbara Erickson and Linda Rosensteel, as Co-Chairs of the Membership Committee, your job is to manage and organize the Guild's membership information and order name badges and welcome members and guests. Do you pledge to greet our members and guests with a smile? You don't have to say, "Welcome to Walmart! If so, say yes.



For Penny Bottomly:

The Rocky Road Block symbolizes the Ways and Means Committee Chair. This block represents ups and downs, but the road ahead can be smoothed when members commit to helping. Penny Bottomly, as the Way and Means Committee Chair, you are charged with our fund-raising opportunities and may establish a committee to assist. Do you pledge to draw the winning ticket with my name on it? If so, say yes.

For Collette Ford:

The Wagon Tracks Block symbolizes the Non-Profit Compliance Officer. Wagon tracts helped pioneers keep on the right path as they traveled out West. Collette Ford, as our Non-Profit Compliance Officer, your job is to keep the FQG in legal compliance at all times and ensure that the Robert Rules of Order are adhered to at the general and board meetings. Do you pledge to "object" when someone is out of order and keep our Guild on track? If so, say yes.

For Barb Anderson:

The Bread Basket Block symbolizes the Treasurer. This block is asymbol that our activities must fit our budget. If so, say yes.



For Tricia Voight (left):

The Tree of Life Block symbolizes the 1st Vice President. The Tree of Life represents our personal development. Ann Turley, as our



Minutes from the Executive Board Meeting August 20, 2021

Meeting opened at 10:05

Next Guild meeting on Sept. 9

Next Board meeting Sept 22, 1:30 at Tricia's house, 1417 Knoll Park Lane Board members in attendance: Frannie Marr, Ann Turley, Karen Johnston, Tricia Voight, Barb Anderson, Penny Bottomly, Linda Rosensteel and Barbara Erickson. Collette Ford was excused. Guests: Mara Woods and Sandy Scott.

First order of business Adoption of minutes Karen made the motion, it was seconded and adopted.

Action items from last Board meeting were addressed and have been completed except for Collette's items which cannot be completed till the end of August.

Programs: Ann Turley

Allyson Allen our August speaker filed for unemployment. Ann received a letter which questioned the Guild regarding Allyson's engagement. All contract info was mailed to answer the inquiry informing them that we are a nonprofit and have no paid employees. That should cover the question. We were not being sued and no payment has been made to Allyson Allen other than the traditional honorarium.

September: Because our speaker double booked for the day, Ann expressed the need to have the program immediately follow the opening of the meeting. This will allow time for her to make it to the next engagement. Before the meeting we need to make sure the audio equipment is working.

October: Five individuals are needed to do demos. Penny Bottomly, Mara Woods, Tricia Voight, Barb Anderson, and Ann Turley agreed to this. Ann will notify members that everyone should bring a basic sewing kit including needle, thread, scissors, pins, to be able to participate.

There was discussion on whether to renew our Zoom contract. A motion was made to let the contract lapse until it was needed saving the Guild \$150. It was seconded and passed.

Discussions regarding the Global Quilt Connection followed. It was decided that rather than the Guild paying \$200/year, members be responsible for paying the \$20 fee for individual participation. It was also suggested that it might be a way

to foster more group interaction as those individuals could meet as a group to watch the presentations.

November: Ann Harris will be the featured quilter. Everyone is invited to bring a quilt which will be displayed. There will be awards for several categories. There was extensive discussion on how to display the quilts. This will be decided later. Frannie will check with the Community Center on details for time and setting up.

There was a suggestion for a mini auction for the members showcase using donated items.

Another suggestion was made for having members hold and fold quilts as speaker is describing them to improve the flow. It was noted that Allyson Allen was offered this assistance but refused.

December: Annual potluck. There was a suggestion for games instead of music. Penny will design a game for interaction. Quilt abbreviations, scavenger hunt were examples.

<u>Treasurer report: Barb Anderson</u>

There is \$34,654.39 currently in the account.

There was discussion on how to market the Opportunity Quilt. A motion to continue with raffle tickets was made by Karen Johnston and seconded by Ann. Discussion followed on the legality of a raffle. We need to be registered with the state which we are, as well as being certified as nonprofit. The motion carried. It was decided that the quilt be registered from September through August 31. Drawing for winner at August meeting 2022, August 4, 2022. Members can prepay and sell tickets if desired.

Do we want to continue with Opportunity quilt?

A suggestion was made that we make small quilts as opposed to a big quilt. Friendship groups could be responsible as opposed to whole Guild. Seasonal mini quilts could be displayed each month. The winner would receive all the quilts.

For the coming year Sandy Scott who has several quilts made during the past year has generously offered to donate one as the next opportunity quilt. Sandy will bring quilts for selection. Penny is working on getting tickets printed.

Membership: Linda Rosensteel reported 66 members, 3 new members from meeting, 9 exempt members. There will be a BCC email to nonpaying members

alerting them that if not paid by September meeting they will be dropped as active members. If attending future meetings, they must pay \$10 each meeting or half membership in January. A trifold brochure has been printed and given out; the Chamber is excited to have Guild participation.

Barbara Erickson reported we will be participating in the Sept Wine and a Bite and need to demonstrate a work in progress. A table will be provided outside the arts center. A suggestion was made to hang a design wall behind the table with a cutting board and blocks assembled to show how the layout can be changed. The date is Sept 10, 5:30 – 8:30 pm. We will be right next to the chamber. Tickets can be sold. The current opportunity quilt, Purple Quilt, will be displayed.

We are on a wait list for a table at the Pala Mesa fundraising Dinner Sept 15, \$55/dinner.

The Fallbrook Harvest Festival, downtown, October 17, Sunday 9:00–4:00. We need to provide some type of children's craft. It is \$30 for a spot, and we need to provide our own table and chairs. Craft ideas include our cutting out blocks from colored paper or wallpaper books for kids to glue down making their own quilt block design. We can have simple items for sale. Volunteers are needed to prepare.

The scarecrow for downtown will be up at beginning of October. A workshop on making scarecrows will be attended by Tricia and Frannie.

Friendship groups are being contacted to identify members and asked if they need more members or want to meld with another group to increase size. A List of friendship groups is being compiled.

Fallbrook Boosters are looking for donors; we are not interested.

Website – A suggestion has been made to have a banner on the front-page advertising the next meeting with time and date.

Sandy will investigate this. Dixie and Sandy have been maintaining our Facebook and quilt show pages, but nothing is happening right now.

Frannie and Mara made a review of committees and chairpersons updating as needed.

The meeting adjourned at 11:55.

up.

Collette: Opportunity Quilt, send a report to the state at that time to close out

the 2020-2021 year.

Collette: Register the new opportunity quilt for the period Sept 1, 2021, to Aug

31, 2022, to cover ourselves legally.
